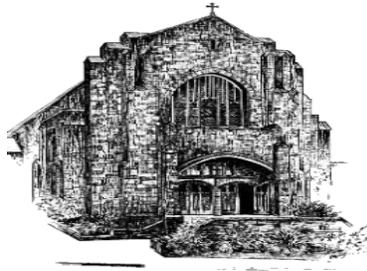

Pastoral Perspectives for April 2018

Grace and peace to you from God the Father of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ in the Holy Spirit.

As you are all well aware, we are celebrating Easter Sunday on April 1st this year! No joke! The time will also be moved an hour ahead to 10:00 am. No joke!

April is a time when we all look forward to Spring and warm weather, but as I am writing this, we are already under three inches of snow! Kimberly and I were able to celebrate our 25th Wedding Anniversary in Germany last year in Advent, during the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation, which was very special to us both. The latest picture up in my office, over my right shoulder, is a photo of a small bedroom that is focused on a simple chair and writing desk with sunlight pouring into the windows. The desk and chair belonged to Rev. Dr. Dietrich Bonhoeffer born Feb. 4th, 1906- died April 19th, 1945. It is difficult to put into words my feelings as I toured the Bonhoeffer Haus in Berlin and spoke with the pastor who was living there with his family. To see and to touch the writing desk of such a powerful Lutheran theologian since Martin Luther was a humbling experience for me; so much so that I didn't take as many photos as I usually do when we travel. I found the silence in the room to make it a sacred place.

Speaking to a retired pastor recently he pointed out how so many Lutherans, and Christians in general, *admire* Jesus but are less likely to *follow* Jesus. It's easy to see why, as Rev. Dr. Nestigen says, "*to follow Jesus, you have to look good on wood.*" April 19th will pass us by with little fanfare in the Lutheran Church but it is the day that the final orders were given to execute the last conspirators against Adolf Hitler from the "*Abwehr*" to overthrow Adolf Hitler and the Nazi regime. Few people took up this cause and those who did paid for it dearly with imprisonment, torture and finally with their lives. The Bonhoeffer family lost sons and a brother in law to the Gestapo. This left their elderly father, Dr. Bonhoeffer, to return to work and provide for the widows and their children.

Rev. Dr. Bonhoeffer wrote, “when Christ calls a man, He bids him to come and die”; to die to the earthly desires and wants of this world and all its possessions that end up possessing us instead! To take up the cross and follow Christ is not for the faint of heart, that is why there are so many more admirers of Jesus than there are followers, because of the cost of discipleship that is asked by Jesus when we follow Him. Sadly, many Lutherans don’t even know who Dietrich Bonhoeffer was or what he did in his short life as a pastor and professor in the Lutheran Church. While writing this perspective, I glanced at my pastoral desk diary 2018: the April 19th date remains empty, but the Pastor who replaced Martin Luther, *Johannes Bugenhagen* on the 20th and Theologian *Anselm of Canterbury* on the 21st are both clearly marked. It may be because it was a dark time for the Lutheran church from 1933-1945 in Germany, that many wish to sweep it under the rug and *just move on* as the expression goes. We as Lutherans have to accept the good, the bad and ugly of Luther’s writings and the history of the Lutherans as well. This may be, in part, the cross that we must bear as Lutherans who no longer admire Jesus from a distance but instead forces us to get our hands dirty.

When I left the ELCIC church in Canada I did so when the Canadian Bishops remained silent on the issue of heretical pastors who wrote and proclaimed from the pulpit that Jesus never rose from the dead! Not sure how they actually celebrate Easter Sunday, but that is their problem. This was my last straw for me as my letters were ignored by the powers that be in the ELCIC. So Kimberly and I had to look for a new church body that actually believed in the Word of God, had to sell our home, give up both our jobs, leave our families, our friends, our colleagues and move to begin our lives all over again. The only piece of paper that I left on my desk as I closed the church office door behind me was a poem by Rev. Dr. Bonhoeffer titled, “Who Am I?” Following Christ and taking up the cross is never easy for it will cost us dearly in our lives, but to be honest with you there is no other place I would rather be than at the foot of the cross of my Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. For it doesn’t matter what happens to us here as we journey through the good, the bad and the ugly times, in the end we know and trust that we are God’s children and His alone.

Evangelism Report
April 2018**

I was reading.....Every day, each of us has the opportunity of breaking barriers and living our dreams if we can learn the secret of getting in the game. We may be nervous or young or inexperienced, but Jesus promised an abundant life----a life beyond amazing. That means we must step up to the plate and trust Him to bless us in unlimited ways, despite our human limitations.

You Have a God Without Limitations

Though it boggles our minds, we must meditate on God as the Bible describes Him. By definition, the concept of God implies infinity. Our God is boundless, immeasurable, inexhaustible, and unfathomable. The Westminster Shorter Catechism says, "God is a Spirit, infinite, eternal, and unchangeable, in his being, wisdom, power, holiness, justice, goodness, and truth." Notice these two words: Infinite. Eternal.

The more frustrated we grow at our limitations, the more we need to do as Isaiah told his discouraged readers: "Behold your God!" (Isaiah 40:9). Isaiah went on to exhort the Babylonian refugees who felt forsaken: "Have you not known? Have you not heard? The everlasting God, the Lord, the Creator of the ends of the earth, neither faints nor is weary. His understanding is unsearchable. He gives power to the weak, and to *those who have* no might He increases strength. Even the youths shall faint and be weary, and the young men shall utterly fall, but those who wait on the Lord shall renew *their* strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint" (Isaiah 40:27 – 31).

God Asks Us to Pray Without Limitations

Jesus said, "Most assuredly, I say to you, whatever you ask the Father in My name He will give you. Until now you have asked nothing in My name. Ask, and you will receive, that your joy may be full" (John 16:23 – 24).

That's the very essence of petitionary prayer---we acknowledge God's unlimited resources and appeal to the promises He has made. We have a sacred invitation to bring our thoughts and dreams into the presence of God. Jesus articulated that invitation in John 16:23 – 24: 'In that day you will no longer ask me anything. I tell you the truth, my Father will give you whatever you ask in my name. Until now you have not asked for anything in my name. Ask and you will receive, and your joy will be complete.'

We Should Live in His Limitless Nature

As we learn to pray to our unlimited God we should learn to live in His limitless grace. "God gives the Spirit without limit" (John 3:34, NIV). The Bible also says, "[He] is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory...." (Ephesians 3:20 – 21, NIV).

Review the verses I've quoted in this article, and offer a definite prayer right now, committing your need to Him and claiming His victory. Ask for His Spirit without measure.

**1st Lutheran
Roof Report
April 2018**

The roof(s) at 1st Lutheran, is stable, repair is ongoing, but kept up. The condition of our main slate roof, the slate themselves have about another 12 – 14 years left in them. I believe the roof will reach it's 100th birthday sometime in the next 7 – 10 years. The repaired slate resulting in the chimney falling through the roof a number of years ago are of course newer than the original slate and look good.

We did a lot of repair on both the main slate roof, and the rubber roof on the school this last season. We updated and repaired old leaking flashing, we repaired the area which had been repaired when the chimney fell through, as the wrong size slate had been used, way back at the repair date, we repaired over 150' of seam on the rubber roof that had started to allow water enter the school building, we removed the old chimney that was unstable, about to fall again, and repaired and rebuilt a chimney. We also repaired burst down spouting coming off the roofs and now have a yearly leaf and down spout clean-out program in place.

There is ongoing repair to all our roofs, especially the rubber roof, that continues to be sliced and punctured by our falling slate (result of rusting hangers), and the old building next door to the church, whose slate are failing, falling and hitting our rubber roof. We need to rechalk our coping stones, which allow water to run into the inner walls of our church, and are looking to do that this season, which is as soon as we can after we realized that this has to be done.

This season there needs to be further repair on flashing, rubber roofing to be installed in the parapets, that need it, especially in the front one, above the main entrance that holds two air conditioner units.

The numbers I have received on the "New Roof Fund", which would go toward a new roof in 12 – 14 years is at \$2,665.75.

This season, we hope to repair the coping stones at the top of the walls of the church, continue to repair both roofs and continue working on stopping the flow of water into the church through the roof system.

Embracing Hope

Embracing Hope is our international mission. This project helps the poorest of the poor. We have been sponsoring two little girls in Ethiopia for several years. This sponsorship of \$136 per child, per month, provides them with food, clothing, medical care, education, and so much more. This program is preserving families and giving them HOPE and dignity.

The Shannon family is planning to move to Istanbul, Turkey this summer. Questions have been asked about what will happen to the Ethiopian project. Jerry Shannon will still be the Executive Director, but there is an Ethiopian Director and board that will continue to handle the Day Care on a daily basis. They now have over 200 families involved with the project that started with approximately 20 families that met in the Shannon household 8 years ago and has expanded several times to include a day care and school. **GOD at work.** Many of these children would not have survived without the help of Embracing Hope.

Update from the Treasurer

First, a few items to note:

- We have a dedicated 'server quality' computer in the counting room that backs up the office computer, the treasurer information and is the source for our new accounting software system.
 - All treasurer information is also backed up weekly to a [box.com](https://www.box.com) account
- We had an accounting intern from California University of PA with the assistance of Mrs. Sabol enter and verify all information up to Oct 2017 in our accounting system as a start.
 - I entered the remaining information for Nov and Dec 2017 to finish the year.
- I (we) need to verify that the 2017 information matches the bank balances and funds allotments before 2017 can be 'closed' and information for 2018 can be entered.
 - I have not done this.
 - Our CD's need to be entered as assets in the accounting system
- We are currently reviewing all of our directed fund balances and plan on issuing quarterly reports in the newsletter starting with 1st quarter reports in the April newsletter.
 - We have yearly summary reports available back to 2010 with the exception of 2011

We are looking for assistance in the following:

- Verify the balances in the computer system against spreadsheet ledgers for 2017.
- Help streamline the entry of deposits and expenses
- Help develop the reports needed to provide quarterly, and even monthly reports for general distribution.

Currently I have H&R Block review our Payroll withholding and Tax reporting. My next planned meeting is in June 2018

We are investigating the employment of a professional who is familiar with Church accounting to assist us going forward.
