Pastoral Perspectives for July-August 2018

Grace and peace to you from God the Father of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ in the Holy Spirit.

As I put pen to paper (or fingers to keys) I have already noticed that once school is out people have gone away on their summer vacations! There is so much to see and do in this amazing country that we live in.

During the summer many people decide to “take church off” for the summer. This brings us to one of my favourite church cartoons where Moses is holding the 10 Commandments and tells the people, *“The good news is that there is only ten of them, the bad news is they are not suggestions”*. Everyone misses a service on occasion but when I take vacation time I love the opportunity to visit churches and meet other congregations and see what they do in their worship. We were blessed in Gettysburg last year to make the early church service of the historical Lutheran church which was used as a hospital during the battle. The woman who greeted us that morning was a relative of Rev. Dr. Dozer! What a small world! It was also nice being in the pew and being part of the congregation.

The 3rd Commandment from the Holy Bible and Luther’s Small Catechism is: ***“Remember the Sabbath Day and keep it Holy”*** What does this mean? ***“We should fear and love God so that we do not despise preaching and His Word, but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it”***.

So, whether you are near or far this summer on your vacation take the opportunity to drop in and be part of worship while you are recharging your batteries. During our time in Germany during Advent, as we celebrated our 25th Silver Wedding Anniversary, we were able to worship at two highly important Lutheran Churches in Berlin; this was absolutely amazing for us!

Luther’s Large Catechism expands on the importance of attending worship: ***“Whenever God’s Word is taught, preached, heard, read, or meditated upon, then the person, day, and work are sanctified. This is not because of the outward work, but because of the Word, which makes saints of us all.....Note therefore, that the force and power of this***

commandment lies not in the resting, but in the sanctifying, so that a special holy exercise belongs to this day....Here a work is to be done by which a person is himself made holy. This is done (as we have heard) only through God's Word" (LC 192, 94).

Keeping the Sabbath Holy is a challenge in our increasingly secular world as Sundays have become another day of working, shopping and entertainment! Trying to keep the Sunday holy is a challenge for all Christians nowadays as many are called to work at hospitals, stores and other areas of employment.

This is the reality but while on vacation even I get the opportunity to gather and worship in other towns and cities with people who worship and believe in the same Lutheran tradition that has just celebrated 500 years of standing firmly on God's Holy Word.

In September, when classes commence and many of you are returning to church, please feel free to show me your photos and share your experiences of worship in one of the many other Lutheran churches wherever your vacation took you. I have already received texts and photos from one of our families who recently visited the Museum of the Bible and there they saw an original Luther Bible dated 1545 which was signed by Martin Luther himself; they didn't even have to go to Germany to see it!

Enjoy your vacations and may God bless your time with family and friends on your journeys. Rest, recharge your batteries and keep the Sabbath Day holy wherever you go and it will be a joyful experience.

July – August 2018

Here we are during summer season, and this is a report for July and August, In this time we are in our “summer mode”, I wanted to keep our Ethiopia Mission commitment in our minds and hearts, regardless. I was reading.....

A Month In The Life Of So Many

The richest man on earth is Jeff Bezos, founder of Amazon, who has sped past Bill Gates, founder of Microsoft. Bezos is worth \$105 billion, while Gates has \$92 billion. They live within a mile of each other on a Seattle lake, and millions of people study aerial views of their homes. Newspapers and Internet sites seem fascinated by the richest people on earth. But think of the other side of the equation. Who is the poorest person in the world? We don't see headlines about that.

Whoever it is probably lives in the Central African Republic. Ironically, this is a nation rich in diamonds, gold, oil and uranium. It was a majority Christian country until 2013, when Muslim rebels seized power and triggered a humanitarian disaster. Thousands have been killed and more than 1 million displaced. Three-fourths of the people live in extreme poverty, and half of the nation's medical facilities are nonfunctional. Central African Republic ranks with Somalia, Malawi, and Burundi as one of the poorest nations on earth.

Take a moment to imagine a month of a person in extreme poverty. No refuge from heat or insects or rodents. Not enough food to quench hunger. No treatment for your sick child. No way to change your tattered clothing. No clean water or sanitation. Nothing but dirt and rags and squalor.

We're Not Personally Responsible To Solve All The Problems In The World, But We Are Responsible To Help Where We Can.

According to the World Health Organization, more than 16,000 children under 5 die every day in the world who could be saved if they had milk, vaccines, medications, clean water, safety or sanitation. Try as I might, I can't really imagine living 30 days in such conditions. We know those who do---missionaries,

Aid workers, and humanitarian servants (our Shannon Family), God bless them all---but it's hard for most of us to imagine.

Yet, we don't have to go to southern Asia or eastern Africa. There's a lot of poverty at our doorstep. Kids in America are hungry too. More than 13 million children in the U.S. don't get enough to eat. One in six American children rub their stomachs at bedtime with nothing to satisfy their hunger pangs. For the first time in American history, half of all public school students are from low – income families, and almost any public school teacher will tell you about children who come to school hungry each day. Imagine a month in the life of a child like that.

Or imagine being one of the 40.3 million slaves in today's world. Most of them are women and girls, and no region of the world is exempt. (Why aren't we hearing this from our news media, instead of the "silly politics" and fake news they are focused on?). Even in America, there are an estimated 57,700 slaves, which includes victims of human trafficking, forced labor, debt bondage, and forced marriage.

We can't imagine the horrors of a month in the life of even one of those people, but neither can we ignore their plight.

Look Around You, Find A Need, And Seek To Help Someone Else.

We can't ignore the numbers of people in the world without access to the Word of God. According to the Joshua Project, slightly more than 19 percent of the world's nearly 17,000 people groups have ready access to the Gospel. Another 22 percent is partially reached. Ten percent are superficially reached. Nearly seven percent are minimally reached. But 41.5 percent of the people groups in the world are still unreached. According to Wycliffe Bible Translators, about 114 million people have no access to any Scripture in their first language, and at least 1.5 billion are without the full Bible in their first language.

I don't like to go for a single day without reading the Bible, thinking about God's Word, praying, and walking with the Lord Jesus. What about a month in the life of someone who has not even a syllable from God's Word in their language? (I'll bet our brother Dennis Schmidt's Gideon's Organization are working from these same numbers).

What Can We Do This Month?

I know these statistics can make us feel overwhelmed. But God isn't overwhelmed, and I'm not reporting these things to make us feel guilty. We're not personally responsible to solve all the problems in the world, but *we are responsible to bring help and hope and healing where we can*. While we cannot fix every problem, we can be part of God's plan for touching the needs He brings to our attention, such as '**Embracing Hope Ethiopia**', one of our missions at 1st Lutheran Church, or our support of '**NALC's National Disaster Response Warehouse Program**' that we are a part of.

So, what can we do this month, next month, and each month to affect the lives of so many who are hurting?

Be Aware. It begins with awareness. Find a subject that deeply touches your heart, and/or follow our church support, or suggest to our church to support issues like world hunger, illiteracy, persecution, human trafficking, or children's evangelism. Stay current. Find some websites that convey accurate information and give regular updates.

Be Prayerful. As you become aware of issues, make them matters of prayer. Join in prayer with our church, and pray daily for the pastors and Christians who are there (like our Shannon Family), asking God to equip them to serve the multitudes. You might come across the name of a Christian imprisoned in a hostile land, (Like Pr. Andrew Brunson, in Turkey). Pray daily for that believer and his or her loved ones.

Be Local. As you think about global needs, remember that someone needs you close at hand. Perhaps there is a student needing tutoring; a clinic needing volunteers; a church needing drivers; a family needing food; a teen needing counseling; a homeless vet needing someone to buy his newspapers; an elderly soul needing a visit. You don't have to invent an entire organization to help. Just look around you, find a need, and seek to help someone else.

I have to say, that the folks here at 1st Lutheran church, have been very aware and generous whenever there has been a need, whether it has been for a repair to the church, or a mission project, or stepping up for choir, counsel, or the prayer team. And for that we are so blessed. Thank you all.

“Adopt A Window”
Project Newsletter Report
July/August 2018

As you know, the upkeep on our beautiful church is an ongoing project. People are always asking “what can we do?”, or “how may we help?” Well, there has been a great suggestion made concerning the church windows: How about a “Adopt a Window” project? There are 67 windows at 1st Lutheran, most of which needed painted, chalked, scraped or repaired. If any are so inclined, we have the materials needed to do these, if there is anyone who has the ability to actually do this type of work, or support the window project that has to be hired out to someone that does plastering and this sort of repair. We are talking only about the windows that are easy reach and are able to be worked on from the floor. Those that are outside, and need a ladder and are on the 2nd floor, would be handled by a painter/plasterer. We need to hire a painter/plasterer to fix the arches and walls and sills throughout the church.

This note is to let you know that the “adopt a window project” is a goal of those that do a lot of work at the church. There are a number of volunteers that keep a constant flow of work and repair to the church, and the windows and arches and plaster work is a goal, that we have not been able to get to yet. I plan on putting up a list of the repairs and progress of the projects that have already been done at 1st Lutheran, and will also put up a “wish list” of the projects that are ahead. We have been constantly working and repairing our church and in the last 4 years, we have been able to maintain a lot of the needs. We still have a ways to go, but see much progress made, with the small group of volunteers and professionals that we have working with us.

Thank you for all you do, and thank you for always supporting the repair projects here at 1st Lutheran Church.



FLC Church Council President's Perspective

Where are you with your spiritual conditioning?

What happens to a runner when he or she misses one week of training? How about two weeks or even a month? All athletes will tell you that you almost have to start over. Why, because you lose your conditioning.

Lets transcend that to our Christian church membership today. If you start missing church 3 or 4 days a year, it starts to become more frequent, like once a month. What condition is your spiritual heart in now?

If people who run can't miss training because of conditioning, what happens to your conditioning with God if we miss our training? We need to be fed the word of God daily through reading our Bible, attending church, and attending adult catechism. If we don't study and read God's word, we lose our spiritual conditioning and our spiritual connection to God.

Some people are fearful to come back to God. The necessary Godly response to fear is faith. It is impossible for these two attitudes to coexist in the heart of a believer. Where faith departs, fear will enter. Where there is faith, fear will flee.

When we displace our thoughts of anxiety with the thoughts of scripture, something remarkable happens. We have the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, and God of peace is with us.

The most remarkable thing about the Bible is that even though it was written by over 40 people through a period of 1,500 years, in three different languages, controversial subjects, in 66 different installments, it all fits together like a master puzzle with a logical beginning and a logical ending. All the way through, the plot progresses in a very natural, rational way.

There is one central character in every part of the Bible and every book of scripture—the Lord Jesus Christ. This book has a unity that cannot be explained in human terms. The Bible is a book of units and of unity because it is both God and man.

All scripture is given by inspiration of God. It is breathed out by God. Our joy is to study it everyday, to continue to trust it and continue to study it. We have a Bible that is small enough to hold in our hands, big enough to study forever, and deep enough to satisfy us through eternity.



FRANZ LISZT

Born: October 22, 1811 in Hungary

Died: July 31, 1886 in Germany



Franz Liszt, the virtuoso pianist and composer, was the most famous concert superstar of the 19th century. He was born in what was then the Austrian Empire. His father was Hungarian and his mother was Austrian. At age 6 he took music lessons from his father, Adam Liszt, who worked at the Court of Count Esterhazy, the main sponsor of Liszt's education and career. Liszt continued his music studies in Vienna under [Carl Czerny](#) and [Antonio Salieri](#).

In 1823, at the young age of 12, Liszt moved with his parents to Paris. There he enjoyed an early friendship with [Frédéric Chopin](#), but later they became rivals. At that time young Liszt began his career of a travelling virtuoso. He was adulated all-over Europe, from Ireland to Russia. His concert performances included his own compositions, regarded by many as the most difficult piano music ever written. His elegant, worldly manners in combination with diabolic cynicism and his impressive stage presence and supernatural virtuosity gave cause for rumors, that he must have made a deal with the Devil. His "Mephisto Waltz" depicts the Devil playing a Paganini-style violin on the piano.

Franz Liszt became a friend of many important cultural figures of his time. He attended the Paris premiere of the "Symphonie Fantastique" by [Hector Berlioz](#) and the two composers became good friends. Liszt shared mutual respect with [Mikhail Glinka](#). He also admired [Aleksandr Borodin](#) and promoted his first symphony for performances in Western Europe. Liszt was a friend of [Richard Wagner](#), who was Liszt's son-in-law, until their differences led to cooler relationship in their later years. Liszt's influence on his fellow musicians was legendary. He made superb piano transcriptions of symphonies, operas and large orchestral works of other composers, such as [Ludwig van Beethoven](#), [Hector Berlioz](#), [Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart](#) and [Richard Wagner](#). Operas and symphonies in Liszt's transcriptions became valuable repertoire of many pianists.

Liszt lived and travelled with the married Countess Marie D'Agoult for 12 years and they had three children. In 1847, in Russia, Liszt met the beautiful and wealthy Princess Carolyne Wittgenstein, who soon left her husband for Liszt. In 1848 he became the Director of Music at the Court of Weimar. There, living with Carolyne in her mansion, he composed and revised his most important music, including the "Dream of Love", dedicated to Carolyne. The Church did not allow Liszt to marry Carolyne and also did not allow Carolyne to divorce Wittgenstein, with whom she had a daughter. In 1861 Liszt settled in Rome where Carolyne bought a home and they tried to marry again, but the Church did not terminate Carolyne's marriage until her husband died in 1864. She then changed her mind and lived with unmarried Liszt, who was stuck in this painful situation until the end of his life. Under her influence, he became a religious man and in 1865 Pope admitted Liszt into Holy Orders and commissioned the church music. Since 1870s Liszt taught at the Budapest Conservatory and also participated with Wagner in several concert events in Bayreuth. He spent his last years between Rome, Weimar, Budapest and Bayreuth, where he died in 1886.
