Use these words to meditate upon as you prepare for worship:

We must note in the first place that Christ by His suffering not only saved us from the devil, death, and sin, but also that His suffering is an example, which we are to follow in our suffering...For God has appointed that we should not only believe in the crucified cross, but also be crucified with Him...what is needed is to hold fast and submit oneself to it, as I have said, namely, that one know that we must suffer, in order that we may thus be conformed to Christ, and that it cannot be otherwise, that everyone must have his (her) cross and suffering. When one knows this it is the more easy and bearable, and one can comfort oneself by saying: Very well, if I want to be a Christian, I must also wear the colors of the court; the dear Christ issues no others in His court; suffering must be there...none should dictate or choose his own cross and suffering, but rather when it comes, patiently bear and suffer it.

Listening for the Promise

Weekly Devotional

Good Friday - April 15, 2022

“He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth; like a lamb that is led to the slaughter, and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent, so he opened not his mouth.” -Isaiah 53:7-

In the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus, his anguish pouring forth in blood-stained sweat, pleaded with the Father to be spared the horrors of the cross. But then he adds, “nevertheless, not as I will, but as you will” (Matt. 26:39). In that moment, in spite of desperation for a different course, Jesus surrendered completely to the will of the Father and, thus, to the suffering and torment of the cross. So, at his sham of a trial, in spite of the terrible injustice perpetrated against him, he remained silent before his accusers, refusing to defend himself, knowing full well the agonies that awaited him.

Isaiah, prophesying Jesus’ ordeal, tells us Jesus was “marred beyond human semblance” (52:14). “He was despised and rejected... a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief” (53:3). He was pierced because of our transgressions and crushed because of our iniquities (see 53:5). Jesus, the good shepherd, who lovingly tended his flock, who carried the lambs in his arms and gently lead the young, laid down his life for his sheep (see Is. 40:11 and Jn. 10:11), even willfully sinful, wayward sheep who were turned away from him (see 53:6).

Such astounding love and determination that seeks and even dies for ungodly sinners (sheep) and enemies (see Rom. 5:6-8, 10). How profoundly the extremes to which God went to reconcile the lost to Himself speaks of his longing for relationship with us. Indeed, the cross, like nothing else, reveals the yearning, loving heart of God for all people, no matter how fallen. See his heart as Jesus, suffering as soldiers impaled his hands and feet with spikes and then hung him on a splintered beam by those wounds, uttered, “Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do” (Lk. 23:34). See his heart in his forgiveness and grace that knew no bounds as he interceded for his torturers and killers.

Jesus still intercedes for ungodly sinners and enemies (see Rom. 8:34), and His forgiveness and grace still knows no bounds for those who choose to repent (see Acts 3:19). That’s because he still longs for and promises relationship with people like you and me when we turn to him
