





Listening for the Promise

Weekly Devotional

Eighth Sunday after Pentecost—July 23, 2023

"The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed in his field, but while his men were sleeping, his enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat and went away." -Matthew 13:24b-25-

In this parable Jesus describes the Kingdom of God as a wheat field which a farmer has planted and into which an enemy has sown tares. Although the farmer's servants want to pluck out the tares, he tells them not to, lest they pull up the wheat along with the tares. Instead, he tells them to let the wheat and tares grow together until the harvest, at which time he will separate the tares from the wheat and burn them.

The point of the parable is that the Kingdom of God currently consists of a mixture of Christians and non-Christians. However, when Christ returns, the non-Christians will be separated from the Christians, judged, and removed. Moreover, from elsewhere in Scripture, we know that God's Kingdom will then come in its fullness with the entire creation being renewed. Thus, the fullness of God's Kingdom, the New Creation, and the final removal of the non-Christians all coincide.

But this leaves the question of what we are supposed to do in the meantime. Should we just wait passively for the end? This would make no sense. We live between the penetrating victory of Christ's first coming and the sweeping victory of his second coming. During this time, we are called to be salt and light (see Matt. 5:13-16) and to occupy until he comes (see Lk. 19:13). Yet, we don't know how the proportion of wheat and tares will vary over time. When Christ returns, will there be a wheat field with a minority of tares or a tare field with a minority of wheat?

However, in light of Christ's past and future victory and in light of his command to occupy, we engage the world in hope. And we do so precisely by being the wheat that He has called us to be, growing, bearing fruit, and displacing the tares organically. Of course, if we yank out the tares mechanically, we will damage the wheat around them. However, if we keep on bearing fruit, we may not only displace many tares, but even convert others to wheat! After all, since God's Spirit works through his word (see Heb. 4:12), the pointed application of God's word will soften some hearts while hardening others. Thus, some of the tares will convert; others will simply leave, and still others will choose to remain unconverted in the field. With these last we must patiently bear.

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
