

Listening for the Promise

Weekly Devotional

Eleventh Sunday after Pentecost—August 13, 2023

"And in the fourth watch of the night he came to them, walking on the sea." -Matthew 14:25-

The account of Jesus walking on the water reminds us of a similar account when Jesus calmed a storm. In both cases, Jesus quieted an actual storm. In both cases, Jesus rebuked one or more of his disciples for lacking faith. And in both cases the disciples were amazed by what Jesus had done.

Yet, their amazement took a different form in each account. When Jesus calmed the storm, their wonder took the form of a question: "What sort of man is this, that even winds and sea obey him" (Matt. 8:27b). However, when Jesus walked on the water, their wonder provided the answer to their previous question: "Truly you are the Son of God" (Matt. 14:33b).

In calming the storm and in walking on the water, Jesus showed his disciples that he had control over the forces of nature. As the eternal Word who had created the world, Jesus was able to rule this world. But when he first calmed the storm, the disciples could not yet see his identity this clearly. In walking on the water, however, Jesus revealed more of himself. How so?

In the Bible the waters are the symbol of chaos. In the beginning the world was a watery chaos and was therefore without form and void. And God's Spirit hovered over the face of the watery deep. God formed the world by dividing and limiting this watery chaos, but he later released these waters to destroy the world in the flood. At the Red Sea, God once again divided the waters to let Israel pass through, but then he released these very waters to drown the Egyptians.

In addition to symbolizing chaos, however, the watery deep is also the realm of the multiheaded dragon Leviathan (i.e. the Serpent). In Revelation 13:1, we see Leviathan with seven heads and ten horns rising from the sea. Moreover, Psalm 74:13-14 portrays creation as an act of dividing the waters and crushing the heads of Leviathan. Metaphorically speaking, therefore, God's good creation is a victory over the forces of chaos and evil.

Accordingly, when Jesus came walking on the water, his disciples saw Him dancing on the head of Leviathan. Thus, they finally saw him as the Lord of creation with the full authority to crush the Serpent's head.

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
